
Reflections on the play, Fatty Legs, at the Grand Theatre...

Recycle Your Batteries Here

Marysville has been participating in the LDSB Battery Recycle Program since 2013. We continue to accept expired alkaline and rechargeable batteries for recycling. The collection pail is located in the office and batteries will continue to be collected throughout the school year.

The expired batteries are taken to the LDSB Education Centre where they are weighed and then sent for proper disposal.

Since Marysville's first Battery drop off on October 31, 2013, Marysville has collected and recycled 265 pounds of used batteries.
